## **Academic Misconduct Violations**

As of August 1, 2024, academic misconduct violations were revised in the <u>REG 11.35.05 Code of Conduct</u>. Consult OSC staff about how examples of behavior may fall within the scope of academic misconduct.

Category	Violation Language (Non-exhausted list of examples)
Cheating	a. Copying from someone else's Academic Exercise
	Copying from a lab partner, copying code, copying solutions on an independent assignment
	b. Using materials, equipment, or assistance in connection with an Academic Exercise that has not been authorized by the Instructor
	Using a calculator, notes, or phone, using Artificial Intelligence, asking for help when it has not been authorized
	c. Failing to comply with a condition of academic integrity which has been defined or communicated in a particular course
	This should be used as a last resort when other violations are not applicable. Completing an exam outside of the testing location, disregarding instructions in order to gain an advantage
Falsifying	a. Submitting, as part of an Academic Exercise, data or other information which has been altered or fabricated in such a way as to be misleading
	Including fake citations, including fabricated data not derived from doing the experiment
	b. Providing false information to the University in any manner to achieve an unfair advantage, enhance one's record, or complete a requirement
	Lying to receive an excused absence or extension, submitting false documentation about academic record
	c. Attempting to influence or change an academic evaluation, grade, or record by unfair means
	Requesting a regrade after making changes to the original Academic Exercise
Misuse of Academic Materials	a. Buying, selling, removing, or receiving any information for use in an Academic Exercise when such use has not been authorized by the Instructor
	Buying or selling your assignment, notes, or course materials
	b. Sharing or distributing academic materials, including class notes, in violation of the <u>UNC Policy Manual 500.2 – Patent and Copyright Policies</u> or <u>NCSU REG01.25.02 – Copyright Infringement – Policy Statement</u>
	Posting materials on Chegg, CourseHero, etc.
	c. Intentionally damaging, removing, stealing or making inaccessible the academic work or material of another or the University
	Deleting teammate's work, blocking teammate from accessing assignment, stealing code or exam
Plagiarism	a. Representing the work of others as the Student's own
	Turning in another person's assignment from another semester. This does not apply to using ChatGPT (use Cheating (b) instead).
	b. Submitting written materials without proper attribution or acknowledgment of the source
	Failing to cite the original author, failing to indicate direct quotes
	c. Submitting an Academic Exercise that is the same or substantially similar to one's own previously submitted work(s) without authorization of the Instructor
	Resubmitting an essay used in another course without authorization
	a. Working with another or others in completing an Academic Exercise when the Instructor has required independent work
	Discussing methods for how to solve a problem, dividing up an assignment and each person solves their problems, collectively attempting to solve a problem
Unauthorized Assistance or	b. Providing assistance to another person in the completion of an Academic Exercise, when such assistance is not authorized by the Instructor
Collaboration	Giving assistance - usually one-sided where this student is not receiving assistance such as sending your completed homework or take-home exam when not authorized
	c. Permitting another individual to substitute for one's self or to represent another in an Academic Exercise, course, or graduation requirement
	Having another student take your exam, taking another student's exam for them
